IMPENDING POLITICAL CRISIS IN IRAN

- I. Shah Seriously Considering Replacement of Zahedi.
 - A. Shah's support of present government has been haphazard and sporadic.
 - Recurrent disagreements in past months between shah
 and Prime Minister Zahedi over military matters and
 patronage.
 - 3. Shah characteristically fears a strong prime minister.
 - C. Shah asked Ambassador Henderson on 27 May whether:
 - (1) US and Britain would we come change in the minister, and (2) whether such a change would make oil settlement easier.
 - D. Henderson assured shah that Zahedi has US confidence and that a change of prime ministers now would be extremely damaging to oil negotiations.
 - g. British ambassador Stevens went along with Henderson's support of Zahedi.

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- G. Shah's reaction to US endorsement of Zahedi may redound unfavorably on Zahedi. His intention to remove Zahedi ultimately, may have been strengthened thereby.
- II. Shah Has Repeatedly Proposed Zahedi be Removed, usually charging flagrant durruption to his regime, despite assurances to Henderson.
 - A. Corruption endemic in Iran; nevertheless, convenient removal instrument.
- able dishonesty exists in his government.
- III. Spate Independent Ingrigues Against Zahedi -- most with Majlis 1100.
 ties and some claiming shah's support.
 - A. A group of conspirators under retired general Arfa includes

 Chief of Staff Batmangelitch, some of his former sub
 ordinates long active in anti-Zahedi intrigue; and Mullah

 Kashani's son, now a Majlis deputy. Dr. Mozzafar Baqai

 and his small leftist Workers Party co-operating closely.

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Re reportedly has been shah's first choick for prime

minister and meets shah's requirements more than other

aspirants.

- C. Reformist group--Roshanfekr--seeking support for former
 Razmara lieutemant, Sajadi, through anti-corruption
 Hajlis speeches. Hoseyn Makki believed writing speeches.
- D. Current interruption oil negotiations has encouraged

 Wational Resistance Movement -- now composed of Iran Party

 and other former pro-Mossadeq elements -- to agitate for

 Alayar Saleh, former ambassador to US and one-time

 Mossadeq cabinet member.
- E. Tudeh actively supporting the Roshanfekr group and Resistance Movement campaigns; however, will lend weight wherever it can damage Zahedi government.
- IV. Z ahedi Claims Awareness of Intrigues; says he controls situation.
 - A. Shah's attacks on corruption theme, however, put Zahedi on defensive and he agreed sacrifice Panahi, chief of Seven-Year Plan Organisation.

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- D. General Bakhtiar, military governor of Tehran, doubts the government can last until oil settlement.
- nemoval of Zahedi Would Probably Preclude any Oil Settlement
 on Presently Proposed Lines. It might result in as complete
 breakdown of negotiations.
